 (2 Corinthians 4:16)

If anybody had a right to be discouraged, it was St. Paul. During the course of his ministry, he was beaten, shipwrecked, betrayed, slandered, and imprisoned. Today's second reading gives us some insight into the way Paul handles all of this. Mind you, Paul was a tough guy by nature, but we can't think that he was impervious to the stress and strain of the life he had chosen. The key is that he didn't let discouragement overtake him and rule his life.

Discouragement can make us feel hopeless. It can drain us of all energy and prevent us from keeping up with our everyday tasks. If not dealt with, it is also contagious. It can spread through your whole house. So let's look at one way we can deal with discouragement.

At the Last Supper, Jesus told his disciples, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. You have faith in God; have faith also in me" (John 14:1) Here he was about to face the cross, and yet he spent his last hours on earth helping his friends—by urging them to trust in God. As comforting as these words sound, they also contain a vital strategy: *Hold on to your faith! Trust that my Father and I won't abandon you.*

Whenever we face times of discouragement, we can picture Jesus saying to us, "Don't let your heart be troubled. It's true that *in the world you will have trouble*, but never doubt that *I have conquered the world*" (see John 16:33)

St. Paul, echoing Jesus, assures us that nothing can separate us from God's love (Roman 8:38-39). It's the knowledge of this truth that kept him from giving in to discouragement. This same motto can help us too.

*"Jesus, help me to hold fast to your promises."*

*Hold on to your faith! Trust that my Father and I won't abandon you.*

Here is today's "Public Service Announcement" by a well-known commentator I'll name. First, listen to his words. "The devil is more intelligent than us mortals and should never be argued with...He is evil, he's not like the mist. ...He's a person, not a diffuse thing. He'll turn you upside down and he'll make your head spin. He does it with priests and with bishops." Is this coming from some TV "talking head"? Or an excited evangelist on a small cable channel? Hardly. Those comments were part of an interview Pope Francis gave recently on the Catholic channel TV 2000. I quote His Holiness, our chief Pastor, for two reasons. First, to satisfy the voices that occasionally rise up lamenting that "they never hear a priest speak of the devil in a homily." Well, you have not only the pope but the likes of me talking about the fallen angel. Secondly, I bring the subject of Satan to the fore because so many so-called sophisticates and even Catholics label any such talk as ridiculous and outdated.

Here is another pope, this time Pope Saint John Paul II during a May 24, 1987 visit to the Sanctuary of St. Michael the Archangel: The battle against the devil, which is the principal task of Saint Michael, is still being fought today, because the devil is still alive and active in the world. The evil that surrounds us today, the disorders that plague our society, man's inconsistency and brokenness, are not only the results of original sin, but also the result of Satan's pervasive and dark action." Are you thinking of the present day headlines?

My point, dear friends, is to remind you not to feel safe and secure from the devil just because you haven't run into any talking snakes lately. This ever-adapting evil person works behind the scenes of all our modern day plagues. Think internet pornography, opioid addiction, poison gas attacks on children, and that widespread narcissism that believes "it's all about me."

How heartening to hear Jesus say this to his contemporary critics: "If Satan is divided, he cannot stand; that is the end of him." And then, as if to encourage us He adds this: "Whoever does the will of God is my brother and sister and mother." Alleluia!

The story is told of a time when Satan held a strategy session for subverting those who were close to salvation. "What shall we do?" asked Satan. A daring demon stood up and shouted, "I have it! I know what we can do! We can tell people that there is no life after death, that they die like animals." Satan's face fell as he answered, "It will never work. Man is not ignorant; even atheists admit of times when they sense a tomorrow after death."

Another demon spoke, "Here's the solution! Let's say there is no God, or if there ever was one, He is dead—because even if He did create the universe, He has left it now." Satan replied in dismay, "That won't work either; most of them know there *is* a God, even though they don't seek Him."

Other ideas were presented, but none brought hope to Satan and his underlings. Finally, as they were about to give up, one demon leaped in glee, "I have it! A sure solution! The other demons crowded around to hear the plan. "Go tell them that God is real and the Bible is God's Word." A novena means **nine consecutive days** of public or private prayer for some special occasion or intention. Its origin goes back to the nine days that the disciples and Mary spent together in prayer between Ascension and Pentecost Sunday.

To make a novena means to persevere in prayer asking for some favor **over a period of nine days in succession** or nine weeks in succession. It means fulfilling our Lord's teaching that we must continue praying and never lose confidence.

This confidence is based on our Lord's words: "*Ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and it will be opened to you. For whoever asks receives; whoever seeks finds; whoever knocks is admitted.*" (Lk 11: 9-10)
